# Harnett Veterans Treatment Court **Gives Veterans Gift of a Second Chance**

Last month, Harnett County's Veterans Treatment Court celebrated its two-year anniversary. The court was the first of its kind established in North Carolina to give veterans who get in trouble with the law a second chance by giving those who have committed certain misdemeanors treatment instead of traditional punishment.

"Today is a special day," said Program Coordinator Ret. Lt. Col. Mark Teachey. "We're recognizing our two year anniversary."

The ceremony saw considerably less fanfare than the court's one-year anniversary, when officials and the media packed the courtroom to see the graduation of six veterans from the program, including Staff Sgt. Tommy Rieman, an Iraq war veteran who received the Silver Star and Purple Heart who was recognized by former President George W. Bush during the 2007 State of the Union Address and who was featured in the documentary "Halfway Home." N.C. Gov. Pat McCrory also attended last year's ceremony and CBS News covered the event for a segment that aired nationally on CBS Sunday Morning.

Last month's two-year anniversary was more business than ceremony with around a dozen veterans appearing before Chief District Court Judge Jackie Lee to update the court on their progress through the program.

# **Department Spotlight**

### **Harnett County Division on Aging**

The Harnett County Division on Aging is part of the Harnett County Health Department. The Division offers a wide array of programs that serve residents who are 55 and older, as well as the disabled. Programs are funded through local, state and federal funds.

As local public health administrator, Mary Jane Sauls heads the Division and oversees a staff of nine additional employees.

"Our purpose is to provide services specifically tailored to the needs of senior citizens in our county," said Sauls. "We have a wide array of services to keep our senior population active and healthy."

The Division on Aging's programs include:

- Community Alternatives Program for Disabled Adults (CAP-DA), which is a Medicaid program that serves disabled adults who need skilled care but want to remain at home.
- Elderly Nutrition Program, which provides lunchtime meals for sen- • iors age 60 and older five days a week. # Harnett Holds Biggest Veterans Day Event Ever





On Nov. 11, the Harnett County Veterans Council held its largest Veterans Day commemoration ever. Events included the annual Veterans Day Ceremony at Veterans Memorial Park in Lillington, during which two names were added to the Harnett County Vietnam Veterans Monument. The ceremony also memorialized Staff Sgt. Donald D. Stewart of Coats, who was killed in action during the Vietnam War and whose remains were finally brought home to be laid to rest. Next was the annual Veterans Day Parade through Downtown Lillington. After the parade, a memorial service was held for Staff Sgt. Stewart. Following the service, he was buried with full military honors at Lakeside Memorial Gardens in Angier.
