The Harnett County Veterans Council held its annual Veterans Day Ceremony on November 11 at 11 a.m. at Veterans Memorial Park in Lillington.

The guest speaker at this year's ceremony was Maj. Gen. Jody Daniels, chief of staff for U.S. Army Forces Command. Maj. Gen. Daniels has more than 33 years of active and reserve military service and previously served as deputy director and director of Intelligence and Knowledge Development Directorate for U.S. Africa Command in Stuttgart, Germany. Environmental Quality Secretary Tours Harnett Landfill



North Carolina Department of **Environmental Quality Secretary** Donald R. van der Vaart visited the Dunn-Erwin Landfill on October 27 to meet with Harnett County officials and tour one of two disaster storm debris sites the county set up following Hurricane Matthew. The site made debris removal a more efficient process. Harnett County Solid Waste also waived residents' tipping fees for storm debris at both landfills in the weeks after the hurricane, waiving more than \$60,000 in tipping fees.





FEMA Sets Up Recovery Center in Commons

Following Harnett County's addition to the Federal Disaster Declaration for Hurricane Matthew, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) set up a Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) in the Harnett County Commons Area. The DRC allowed residents who suffered losses from Hurricane Matthew to apply for assistance. To date, FEMA has distributed nearly \$1.3 million to 1,691 applicants in Harnett County.

Mental Health Kiosks Placed in DSS, Library



Harnett County and Sandhills Center held a ribbon cutting on October 26 to launch two new Access2Care behavioral health screening kiosks in the Harnett County Department of Social Services and the Harnett County Public Library. The kiosks include an online self-screening tool to provide residents who may suspect they are experiencing behavioral health conditions with greater access to information and assistance. The resource is a first-of-its-kind in Harnett County and Sandhills Center's nine-county region.

Cycle NC Rides Through Harnett County



Cyclists participating in Cycle NC's annual Mountains-to-Coast Bicycle Tour depart from the Cape Fear River Trail Park in Erwin. The park was chosen as a rest stop between Sanford and Clinton along the 400-plusmile journey from Banner Elk to Atlantic Beach.

Harnett County Parks & Recreation hosted more than 1,000 cyclists during Cycle North Carolina's 18th annual Mountains-to-Coast Bicycle Tour.

The tour stopped at the Cape Fear River Trail Park in Erwin as part of a week-long ride of more than 400 miles across North Carolina from Banner Elk to Atlantic Beach.

The park served as a rest stop between overnight stops in Sanford and Clinton.

In addition to Harnett County Parks & Recreation, Dunn Area Tourism Authority also participated in the event, publicizing attractions in Harnett County in hopes cyclists will come back following their ride.

Participants ranged from age 12 to 89, and represented 35 states, as well as Canada and Great Britain. Cyclists averaged around 60 miles a day with rest stops every 15 to 20 miles.
