### Proposed FY 19-20 County Budget

On May 29, County Manager, Paula Stewart, presented the proposed Harnett County budget for 2019-2020 fiscal year. Highlights from the proposed budget include:

- Overall budget increase by 5.4% from FY 2019
- No change to the ad valorem tax rate (remain at 75¢ per \$100 property valuation)
- Appropriation of \$1,921,649 from the fund balance
- \$210,000 to fund for the first year of CCC's Harnett Promise program
- \$260,000 to fund the Veterans Treatment Court
- Solid Waste Director position will be separated from the County Engineer position in FY 2020
- Improvements to the Capital planning process

#### Harnett Regional Water Receives Optimization Award

The N.C. 
The extended hours will allow citizens additional time to dispose of construction and debris waste.

The Harnett County Sheriff's Office Citizens Academy provides citizens an opportunity to learn more about law enforcement and the services provided by the Sheriff's Office. During the class, participants performed hands on experience which included a tour of the Sheriff's Office, 911 communications center and the detention facility, patrol car training, simulation of a real life Crime Scene Investigation and latent print examination, court proceedings and courthouse security, special operations and a K-9 demonstration, and firearm safety and training at 37 PSR Gun Club firing range in Lillington.



### DSS Brings Attention to Elder Abuse Awareness During June

National Elder Abuse Awareness Day is June 15, 2019, but the timeframe that Elder Abuse Awareness focuses on is from Mother's Day (May 12<sup>th</sup>) to Father's Day (June 16<sup>th</sup>). At the Harnett County Board of Commissioners meeting, a proclamation was presented announcing June 15 as Elder Abuse Awareness Day in Harnett County. During this period of time emphasis is spent on recognizing Types of Elder Abuse such as:

- Abuse – Willful infliction of physical pain, injury, mental anguish, unreasonable confinement or willful deprivation by a caretaker of services, which are necessary to maintain mental and physical health.
- Self-Neglect – Disabled adult who lives alone or has no caretaker and is not able to provide necessary services to maintain higher mental and physical health.
- Caretaker Neglect – Failure of the caretaker to provide services necessary to avoid physical harm or mental anguish and to maintain mental health of the disabled adult.
- Exploitation – Illegal of inappropriate use of the disabled adult or his resources for another's profit or advantage.

### Applications Being Accepted for the NC Arts Council Grassroots Art Program Subgrant

Harnett County is now accepting applications for 2019-2020 subgrants from the Grassroots Arts Program. The subgrants are made possible through the North Carolina Arts Council, which has partnered with Harnett County to provide grant funding for local artists and arts-based initiatives in the county.

For the 2019-2020 fiscal year, Harnett County expects to receive \$34,598 in Grassroots funds, of which \$13,543 must go toward multicultural overprogramming.

Grassroots Arts Program funds may be used for expenditures to conduct quality arts programs or operate an arts organization. Grant amounts start at \$500 and may be used for program expenses such as professional artists' fees and travel, space rental, advertising, marketing and publicity, website and electronic media, scripts, costumes, sets, props, music and equipment rental, as well as operating expenses for qualified art organizations not already receiving operating support from the N.C. Arts Council.

Harnett County will host a workshop for prospective Grassroots Arts Program Subgrant applicants prior to the June 28 application deadline. The workshop will be held Monday, June 10 at 3 p.m. in Conference Room A of the County Administration Building at 420 McKinney Parkway, Lillington, NC 27546. Any applicants who have questions about completing and submitting their application should attend the workshop.

### Let's Talk Safety: Hurricane Preparedness & Fire Prevention

#### Don't Blow Off Hurricane Season

June 1 kicked off Atlantic Hurricane season. Hurricanes are among nature's most powerful and destructive phenomena. On average, 12 tropical storms, 6 of which become hurricanes form over the Atlantic Ocean, Caribbean Sea, or Gulf of Mexico during the hurricane season which runs from June 1 to November 30 each year.

Harnett County has seen the impact of several hurricanes over the past few years. In the Fall of 2018, Hurricane Florence impacted the state of NC resulting in \$17 Billion worth of damage. A few weeks later, Hurricane Michael hit us for round 2. Although Harnett County is not on the coast, we still receive damage caused by flooding, strong winds, and fallen trees.

#### Feeling HOT: Wildfire Safety Tips

The N.C. Forest Service urges everyone to be cautious with fire over the holiday weekend. The lack of rainfall in most areas has increased the probability of wildfires, especially within the eastern portion of the state. The U.S. Drought Monitor lists 21 counties in southeast North Carolina as burning dry.

"There are several things to consider before burning debris or lighting a campfire," cautions Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "Some tips to remember are to always check the weather prior to burning. Follow all state and local regulations. Ensure any fires are an adequate safe distance from other flammable material, especially wooded areas and flammable material that may lead to houses. With all fires, maintain a constant watch until the debris pile or campfire is completely out."

### Human Resources Corner

#### How to set financial goals for today, tomorrow and beyond

Setting goals is one of the most important parts of your financial well-being. Without them, you may lose focus of your finances and find yourself in a bind. By identifying what you're striving for, you clearly know where you're going. Think about it: when you get in the car, you have a destination and route in mind, right? With your finances, you won't know where you're going until you identify and set financial goals.

**Two categories**

Financial goals fall into two major categories: short- and long-term. Short-term goals are those you wish to accomplish in the next two to five years. Long-term goals are those you wish to accomplish in five to ten years or longer. Long-term goals since they can sometimes be 10-, 20-, or 30 years away. That's why it's important to identify and commit by writing them down.

**How will you reach your goals?**

Once you have determined your financial goals, you need to figure out how you're going to reach them: A budget, financial calculator or financial professional are some of the tools available to help you as you lay out the steps. You'll also need to identify a time frame and the cost for achieving it. Does it fit into your budget? Use the following formula to determine your required monthly savings:  $\text{goal} / \text{number of months} = \text{required monthly savings}$ .

If the required monthly savings is more than your budget allows, you can reduce other expenses or save for a longer period. When calculating bills, such as retirement and college savings, you may want to consider using financial calculators and professionals.

Visit your local credit union or bank if you need help creating and sticking to financial goals. Lastly, set a time frame for revisiting your goals. Your needs may change over time and your goals will, too.


### Here's the Buzz on National Pollinator Month

This week kicked off National Pollinator Month, which brings awareness to pollinators and how we can continue to protect them. This international initiative celebrates the flourishing ecosystem that bees, birds, butterflies, bats and beetles provide.


You may not realize that pollinators and pollinator gardens are all around us in Harnett County. Cooperative Extension Agent, Selena McCoy, shares valuable tips on the benefits of pollinator gardens in our area.

A good pollinator garden will provide a range of species to visit and flowers that bloom throughout the year, but with summer heat and sun beating down on our doorknobs, we'll take a closer look at the summertime favorites that offer opportunities for individuals and groups to assist with delivering meals to our elderly homebound clients. Newer cultivars are fun and colorful, but they are bred for aesthetics, which can lead to a loss of pollinator-friendly characteristics such as the amount of nectar or pollen and access to what pollen and nectar is present. All of the plants we take a closer look at can be found that Harnett County Ag Center at 126 Alexander Street in Lillington.



Echinacea is a classic pollinator plant. This simple charm of a giant cone surrounded by delicate purple petals has made a happy home in many of our gardens already. This flower also packs a powerful pollinator punch as it not self-pollinating and relies on bees and butterflies to get the job done. Often taken as a supplement to relieve a cold, Echinacea is yet another pollinator favorite that has roots in medicine (see what I did there?). These sturdy plants can handle full sun, fluctuations in soil moisture, and drought. Echinacea is also quick to spread and will fill in open areas.




St. John's Wort is a unique pollinator plant. Unlike the previous plants discussed, St. John's Wort is a shrub that dies back every winter to come back out in spring. And it's a knockout! The deep yellow flowers have a superabundance of stamens (that is to say, a lot) that pollinators can't get enough of. Another plant packed full of history, St. John's Wort is named for a religious feast day, and has been used to treat a wide range of conditions, from wounds to kidney stones. Also unlike other plants, St. John's Wort is happy to grow. Yarrow shows off in full sun and dry soils, but part shade may help limit its growth. Also, keep your eyes on this summer during the summer- beneficial, predatory wasps will also visit yarrow, not just our bumble bees and butterflies!



Yarrow is a flower full of history; its scientific name alludes to its use for treating wounds. It's been used in beer and other drinks, and it now resides happily in many a medicinal or pollinator garden. These flowers are pleased with most conditions and won't hesitate to take over open spaces nearby, so consider using it in an area where nothing else will grow. Yarrow shows off in full sun and dry soils, but part shade may help limit its growth. Also, keep your eyes on this summer during the summer- beneficial, predatory wasps will also visit yarrow, not just our bumble bees and butterflies!
